### **God: The Shepherd of All**

While on retreat recently, I participated in an exercise that had a profound impact on my life. We were asked to find a partner we did not know and then sit facing each other, holding each other's hands. We were asked to first look into our partner's eyes and then look down at their hands. We sat this way for about 15 minutes while a mantra "I love you" played quietly.

As I gazed at my partner's hands I began to "see" hands of people in countries throughout the world, people I did not know, hands of all different shapes, sizes, and skin tones. With each, I thought to myself "I love you." After several minutes my thoughts flowed to the hands of those who traffic other human beings for profit. In my mind these hands also took on different shapes and hues. I remember hesitating; I knew that I was called to say "I love you" to



each of these people also. I also knew that I could only authentically say this by remaining "faithful to the grace of God." (1 Acts 13:43) My thoughts then moved to the hands of some specific people in the news who I disagreed with or I disliked. I knew that each of these individuals were made in the same image and likeness of our God who shepherds us, and so to each I said, "I love you."

This Sunday is often referred to as <u>Good Shepherd Sunday</u>. It may serve to remind us (me!) that God reaches out to all people. God is the shepherd of all, even, and perhaps especially, those individuals who plan evil acts, who not just ignore, but who choose to do all they can to mock and to destroy the most vulnerable in our society and world.

May all those who suffer violence in all it's forms see the Lord in the eyes and hands of those who advocate with them. We pray...


#### **Collect Prayer:**

# Join Us: Franciscans To Fast in Solidarity with Muslims During Ramadan

The recent bombings in Sri Lanka, combined with the 800th anniversary of the meeting of St. Francis and Sultan Malik Al-Kamel during the 5th crusades, the staff of FAN has been daily thinking of our Muslim sisters and brothers. The president and vice president of the Centre for Islamic Studies in Sri Lanka released a <u>statement</u> last week which called for deeper



investigations in to the attacks on Easter as well as urging an end to extremism in all forms. You can read the statement in full on our website.

The Muslim holy observance of Ramadan begins next week at sundown on May 5th and continues to June 4th. Each year, during the 9th month of the Islamic lunar calendar, 1.5 billion Muslims participate in this season when, from sunrise to sunset, they fast from food, drink, and general sinful behavior, such as violence, arguing, and lying. It is seen as an opportunity for Muslims to rediscover their own belief, improve their character, and ensure they bring benefit to society. The idea is to develop a deeper understanding of where you are and what you have in order to become a better person.

Because we wish to stand in solidarity with our Muslim sisters and brothers, and honor their beliefs, we invite all our members and friends to join us in a day of fasting on Friday, May 17th. ## Statement on Passing of Senator Lugar from Jubilee Network

Former Indiana Senator Richard Lugar (R) passed away on Sunday, April 28th. Lugar sponsored and led <u>Jubilee USA</u> legislation and efforts on debt relief, anti-corruption, preventing financial crisis, tax evasion and the Jubilee Act on responsible lending and borrowing.



Eric LeCompte the Executive Director of Jubilee USA, released the following <u>statement</u> last week:

"Senator Lugar was a bridge builder and defender of the vulnerable.

"Lugar was a leader of legislation to prevent financial crisis, provide debt relief for poor countries and make our financial system more responsible and transparent.

"Currently in Congress we face such polarization and so many divides. In Washington DC, we need his kind of leadership again."

### **Gun Violence Prevention News and Resources**

Every state in the union has had at least one school gun incident since 1970. This information was gathered from the K-12 School Shooting Database which is a project of the Department of Homeland Security. Last year stands alone as the worst on record, with 94 incidents of school gun violence documented, an increase of nearly 60 percent over the previous record high in 2016.

As a response to this data, lawmakers in 6 states are now promoting that teachers be armed, despite the March 2018 Gallup poll



which found that 73 percent of U.S. teachers do NOT want to carry guns in school.

<u>Guns & America</u> is a groundbreaking new reporting collaboration of 10 public media newsrooms, focused on a single issue: the role of guns in American life. Their mission is "to go deeper — to bring context, nuance and a human face to some of the most divisive issues of our day."

The Center for American Progress' Gun Violence Prevention team has released a new report, "Guns, Lies, and Fear: Exposing the NRA's Messaging Playbook," examining how the NRA's reliance on fear-mongering and misinformation copies tactics deployed by illiberal and authoritarian regimes.

We urge our members and friends to use this data in your own communities to start conversations and discussions on next steps.

The Mennonite Central Committee (MCC) is a worldwide ministry of Anabaptist churches, "sharing God's love and compassion for all in the name of Christ by responding to basic human needs and working for peace and justice." Click her to read more about their work on migration.

Food shortages, environmental disasters, climate change, poverty and conflict push people to move. Land, resources, jobs, family, health care and education pull people away from their home communities. Some people move voluntarily, a choice made after weighing the pros and cons. Others leave involuntarily, forced by violence, extreme poverty, human trafficking and ethnic cleansing.



All of this points to the number of families seeking asylum is on the rise. The MCC has developed this <u>comprehensive resource</u> with multiple links for more data. We urge you to read through it.

Last week, a joint letter to all national political parties was released requesting that they include repealing the Muslim Ban and reversing the all-time-low cap on the annual number of refugees admitted into the United States as signature issues in their 2020 party platforms. FAN signed on as well as a number of Franciscan groups, communities, and organizations.

The joint statement is in advance of the 2020 national party conventions held by the Democratic, Republican, Green, and Libertarian Parties. During these conventions each political party updates their party platform, which embodies the principles and strategic goals of the party for the next four years.

On Mother's Day we honor the mothers in our families and act on behalf of mothers and children separated at the U.S.-Mexico border. The U.S. administration's policy of separating migrant families has been a chaotic disaster. Even nine months after the administration rescinded its separation policy, it is possible that more children have been separated than the official count of 245 due to the failure of the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) to keep accurate records.



Mother's Day is a particularly significant time to draw attention to the suffering inflicted on mothers and children separated from each other or who are living under family detention.
