Embracing the Call to Witness Love

As we prepare to celebrate Eucharist this week and reflect on the readings for the <u>feast of the</u>
<u>Ascension</u> the phrase, the question, that stands out is "...why are you standing there looking at the sky?"

We can only imagine the dynamic experience of Christ's Ascension. Artists through the centuries have depicted the scene with Jesus rising up into the clouds. Others have painted Jesus surrounded by heavenly hosts of angels. All of these are the "Christianity without discipleship is Christianity without Christ." Dietrich Bonhoeffer



artists' attempts to capture this significant event. Yet, we have no visual, only the words and the testimony of those who were present.

Luke wrote, "Then Jesus led them out as far as Bethany, raised his hands, and blessed them. As he blessed them he parted from them and was taken up to heaven. They did him homage and then returned to Jerusalem with great joy, and they were continually in the temple praising God."

His words are simple and uncomplicated - Jesus parted from them and was taken up to heaven. We also hear of the simplicity of the Apostles' experience and their response - they did him homage and returned to Jerusalem.

What becomes evident in this writing is that too often we might look for and focus on the dynamic experience of the Ascension event as expressed by artists. In our lives, do we spend our time 'looking at the sky,' gazing, watching, looking for Christ? The two divine messengers who questioned the disciples seemed to say, Stop looking up at the sky. There are so many things to do!

Our following Christ goes far beyond 'looking up at the sky'. Our discipleship is an internal and communal dynamic, captured by Luke as he wrote, "...they returned to Jerusalem with great joy and were continually in the temple praising God." The feast of the Ascension calls us to discipleship, to make the values of the gospel, the values of mercy and compassion for all people, peace, justice and the integrity of creation visible and vibrant in our world.

This is the gift of the Ascension and of the Spirit. The Christ who once walked this earth continues to be present and dynamic in us. Let us live and be Christ's disciples with our eyes and hearts focused on the needs of others and alert to the cries for justice.

Final Chance to Sign the Petition: Tell Congress to Tackle the Climate Crisis Now

The Climate crisis is a global threat and our faith calls us to action. The current administration dangerously continues to deny the issue, claiming the science isn't real.

In response to the U.S. being pulled from the Paris Agreement, Congress has introduced the <u>Climate Action Now Act</u> -- legislation that would prohibit the Trump administration from using any funds to withdraw from the agreement and require the administration to submit a detailed plan to Congress on how the United States will meet its climate obligations. The House passed this legislation on May 2nd and now it heads to the Senate.



We must recommit to the goals of Paris Climate Agreement if we want to ratchet down carbon pollution and stave off the worst impacts of the climate crisis. We urge our members and friends to sign the petition to Congress: Tackle the climate crisis and pass the Climate Action Now Act.



New Publication: Studying the Life of Saint Clare of Assisi

FAN was recently made aware of a new publication, Studying the Life of Saint Clare of Assisi, by William Hugo, OFM Cap. and Joanne Schatzlein, OSF.

Published by New City Press, this one-of-a-kind resource helps readers discover St. Clare through a series of crisp chapters that first teach about the sources for St. Clare's life and writings and then apply that knowledge to manageable topics from her life. The book provides also an important introduction to feminine spirituality and religious life options for Medieval women and has been successful with high school graduates and Ph.Ds. It works for anyone who wants to do a guided study of the life of St. Clare of Assisi using primary sources. Those benefiting from this unique approach include Franciscans of all kinds, especially those in formation programs, students of medieval or female spirituality, historians of



religious life, women and men working in Franciscan ministries, former pilgrims who have visited Assisi, and anyone wanting to learn how different people in the history of the Church responded to its changing circumstances.

Take Action: Make a Call for Kenneth Azurdia Hernandez

Last week, more than 400 people have signed signed a letter and called ICE to help stop the deportation Kenneth Azurdia Hernandez. For over a year, this Guatemalan asylum-seeker has been detained and separated from his mother, partner, and two preschool sons who now live in Washington, DC. Just hours after Kenneth was told he would be deported at 11 p.m. last Monday night, he was informed his deportation had been delayed! Now we urge calls to escalate our efforts for a Stay of Deportation.
