Let us be inspired to reject those who stoke hatred and division. Let us reflect on the inspired words of St. Paul to mend our ways, encourage one another, and to live in peace.

In 2013, 15-year-old Hadiya Pendleton was shot and killed in Chicago. After her death, her friends and family wore orange to honor Hadiya and the hundreds of Americans killed and wounded by gun violence every day. Every year since then, to coincide with Hadiya's birthday on June 2, gun violence prevention groups work to continue their efforts by wearing orange on the first Friday of June and the entirety of that



weekend.
