Watchmen/Women 2020

The 2019 HBO miniseries "The Watchmen" has received 26 Emmy nominations. I do not have HBO so have not viewed the highly acclaimed series, but I've read that from the original graphic novel of the 1980s, to the 2009 movie, to the 2019 TV miniseries, the core element has a group of "superheroes" or investigators who must uncover evil plots that threaten destruction of a people. The HBO series opens with the Tulsa Massacre of 1921,



a horrific racist chapter in US history that only recently has become widely known by most White Americans, including me. So I was intrigued by God's announcement to Ezechiel in this week's First Reading: "I have appointed (you) watchman for the House of Israel" whose charge is to "warn the wicked, trying to turn him from his way..." Ezechiel's mission is twofold: reveal the evil being done, and warn perpetrators so they may turn from their ways and escape punishment of death.

In September, 2020 many threats call out for watchmen/women to warn us as a people that we are headed in the wrong direction: systemic racism, widening economic inequality, climate crisis, healthcare crisis intensified by mishandling of coronavirus, deep political, social, religious divisions. All of us who are grounded in the gospel of Jesus are challenged to call out evils in our time and place. This critical moment in our history as a nation is not a time to hide in the shadows, cowering in fear or hopelessness. The times demand that we be a watchman or watchwoman, caring so much about our democracy, our church, our children and grandchildren that we find ways to give warnings and try to turn haters, dividers, and graspers of wealth and power from their ways.

Paul reminds us in the Second Reading that "love is the fulfillment of the law." As we call out warnings, as we "admonish the sinner" as Jesus teaches in the Gospel, we must do so out of love; not a soft, abstract feeling, but "tough love" that seeks conversion of "the wicked," not their damnation; love that does not match violence with violence or hate with hate. The late great watchman, John R. Lewis, gave us a model of how and when to "cause good trouble." Without swerving from truth and right, he showed us how to stand or march as nonviolent advocates for justice. We need not be "superheroes" like John Lewis, or Ezechiel, or the crucified Jesus, but each of us can first do our own soul-searching, and then seize opportunities, either as individuals or with others, to nonviolently challenge abuse, exploitation, cruelty and other destructive behaviors. We can be watchmen, watchwomen, in 2020 and beyond.



National Poll Worker Recruitment Day, Sept. 1

Our democracy depends on hundreds of thousands of ordinary people who make sure elections run smoothly and everyone's vote is counted. As coronavirus continues to impact Americans across the country, there has been a staggering decrease in the number of people who are able to work the polls -- which could mean closed polling places and long delays during the November election.



FAN has learned of a first-of-its-kind initiative called <u>Power the Polls</u>, created to recruit poll workers to ensure a safe, fair election for all voters. Our friends at the Refugee Council, USA (RCUSA) are urging participation in Refugee Advocacy Days from Tuesday, September 1st - Thursday, September 3rd to hold the administration accountable to conducting meaningful consultations with Congress & rebuilding the resettlement program to historic norms - a 95,000 refugee admissions goal (the historic average) in FY 2021. 
friends to access their Advocacy Days Toolkit to find the top 4 ways to take action.

New Reflective Voting Guide on Issues of Racism, Migration, and Climate

The justice and peace promoters from 11 women's religious congregations in Michigan and Indiana have developed a new reflective voting guide for the 2020 election season. The sisters began with and embraced the resolution from the 2019 National Assembly of the Leadership Conference of Women Religious, resulting in the creation of "A Reflective Voting Guide: Creating Communion at the Intersection of Racism, Migration, and Climate Crisis."

The guide contains three study modules on the



issues of racism, migration, and climate crisis for reflection to help prepare the reader for the November elections. Each module has a section on **Experience** of people affected by the issue, **Values** of the issue in light of Catholic Social Teachings, and a **Call for Action**.

A disclaimer notes that the guide "does not contain all the questions to be asked. Nor does it recommend any candidate for office" yet it gently calls readers to participate fully and effectively in the political process of our nation by voting.
