### **Nails Not Needed**

A few years ago, a priest shared a story about visiting a chapel in Namibia where, as he prayed, he noticed that something was different about the wooden crucifix. When he went closer to examine it, he saw that there were no nails holding Jesus on the cross. Why? It dawned on him that it wasn't the nails that held Jesus on the cross—love did.

Have you ever wondered if the excruciating agony of Jesus' crucifixion was really necessary

for our salvation? How could a loving Father God demand the torture of the Son? Certainly God could have chosen another way without so much pain and blood. Wasn't it enough that God became human? But that's the point. Paul reminds us that the Christ came "in human likeness."

In our humanity, we all experience suffering. Only some are tortured. Not all undergo great physical pain. But each of us suffers in some way: loneliness, isolation, depression, rejection, anxiety, abuse, death of loved ones, financial insecurity, impact of racism, spiritual emptiness; not an exhaustive list. For more than a year, the whole human family has suffered with the global pandemic. Is the reason for Jesus' Passion not only about, or even mainly about, payment for our salvation, but about God "in human likeness," desiring to enter fully into the human experience? Is it more about God being present with me in my suffering than it is about saving my soul?

In the <u>Palm Sunday narrative of the Passion</u>, all the palm wavers disappear; the "Hosannas" are traded for cries to "Crucify him!" Jesus is deserted by almost all his closest friends and disciples. From an instrument of torture he cries out, "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" But the good news for us is that we can be sure that God in human likeness knows and understands our suffering and never abandons us. God is with us, even when we don't feel God's Presence. Self-emptying love is what kept Jesus on the cross.

# Sisters of St. Francis of Philadelphia Join Resistance against Environmental Racism

Chester, Pennsylvania is a small city south of Philadelphia located in Delaware County. The motherhouse of <u>The Sisters of St. Francis of Philadelphia</u> (FAN Institutional Members) is in Aston, PA just 6 miles from Chester. The sisters are active members of the Chester Residents



Concerned for Quality Living and in a recent community newsletter shared that Chester is "home to the largest trash incinerator in the country (Covanta), a sewage waste treatment facility and sludge incinerator (DELCORA), chemical manufacturing plants, and other polluting industries."

The sister's newsletter contains an impassioned plea to <u>read the message from Chester Residents</u> in order to be fully aware of the toxic trash incineration happening in the area. They request residents participate in an action alert by signing onto a letter to the Chester City Council and Delaware County Council urging an end to the pollution.


