# Signs of the Kingdom of God

I don't know about you but I don't often find myself sitting around thinking about the kingdom of God. Oh yes, I believe in the kingdom, especially that it is here with us, yet not fully revealed. I also believe that Jesus truly meant it when he said the kingdom of God is within us and that it is in our midst. However, life's daily schedules, the cares and concerns of the present moment and, especially in this pandemic year, the numerous Zoom



webinars and meetings, tend to keep me rooted in the here and now.

Nevertheless, like me, you might be seeing signs of new life emerging from the throes of winter and the ever-growing vaccine efficiency with the lessening of Covid restrictions. These promising signs anticipate feelings of hope, light-heartedness and a re-emergence of newness from the darkness and gloom of a pandemic. Perhaps we all need a solid dose of the hope and the refreshing breath of the kingdom of God. Our readings for this <u>Eleventh Sunday of Ordinary Time</u> are the right place to start!

Both the reading from the book of Ezekiel and the gospel of Mark 4:26-34 present us with delightful images of the kingdom through nature and creation. What Franciscan would not delight in thoughts of high and lofty mountains, seeds, plants, fruitful trees and winged creatures. All of this is in our Franciscan DNA. We are rooted and grounded in the God of all creation. We are immersed in a God who delights in beauty, creativity and imagination. To be connected with the Source of All Life, we must recognize that we are God's creation, integrally one with all creatures and all of creation. We are called to express and make visible God's kingdom of beauty, creativity and imagination. How are we signs of the kingdom?

One only has to spend time reading our Franciscan Sources to see how our charism and spirituality arose from people who were inspired, imaginative and creative. For St. Francis, my thoughts immediately went to a story in the Legend of the Three Companions, Chapter XVI. Francis had sent brothers to other countries to preach. Upon their return they expressed great bitterness because of the mistrust and harassment they experienced from some people and even from the clergy.

Francis, not to be deterred in the gospel mission, sought help from Rome for a Cardinal Protector. He did this because he had a dream. In his dream Francis saw a hen, small, black, with feathered legs and the feet of a domestic dove. It had many chicks and was unable to gather them under her wings. As Francis awoke from his dream he realized and said, "I am that hen, short in stature, and dark by nature...The Lord in his mercy has given, and will give me, many sons whom I will be unable to protect with my own strength. I must, therefore, commend them to the holy Church who will protect and guide them under the shadow of her wings."

Francis, poor, simple and humble, was definitely a man who lived with a dream and his eyes fixed on making the kingdom of God visible and nothing would dissuade him. In his later years his lyrical prayer of the Canticle of Creatures inspired and still inspires us today. Francis was intimately connected with all life and the kingdom, praising God through sun, moon, stars, wind, water, fire and yes even through our bodily death which is so much a part of the cycle of life.

Are we living as signs of God's kingdom? Our world today is in need of creative and imaginative people who are intentional and attentive to the signs of God in our midst and who speak and witness to the gospel of God's love, mercy, compassion and justice. In the words of John E. Lewis, "If not us, then who? If not now, then when?" May our gift to God be this one precious life we have been given. May God's breath and Spirit fill us with the creative imagination and courage to give our lives totally to bring the kingdom to birth in our time.

## What does Welcome With Dignity Mean?

As an active member of the Interfaith Immigration Coalition, we often promote welcoming with dignity. But, one may ask, what does #WelcomeWithDignity really mean?

It means embodying our faith values by protecting children at our border,



allowing asylum seekers to exercise their right to claim asylum, and respecting the sacred humanity and dignity of all of our neighbors.

**Here are 5 ways to take action** in helping transform how the U.S. receives and protects people forced to flee their home countries:

- Advocate: <u>Call or email your Members of Congress</u> and urge them to hold the Biden administration accountable to end Title 42 expulsions; restore asylum protections; and invest in the U.S.' capacity to humanely welcome and process asylum seekers, unaccompanied children, and immigrants.
- 2. **Sign the #WelcomeWithDignity Pledge:** Add your name and join the movement to reimagine the way our country treats people seeking safety.
- 3. **Host a Faith Vigil:** Plan a vigil to raise awareness and support for ending Title 42 expulsions and creating a more humane asylum process.
- 4. **Sign a Faith Letter:** Add your name to <u>this letter</u> (by June 16) to urge President Biden to end Title 42 and restore asylum protections. Individual Faith leaders, <u>sign here</u>. Faith-based organizations, <u>sign here</u>.
- 5. 
<u>Bp. Stowe, OFM Conv.</u> kicked off the campaign with an engaging homily for Pentecost Sunday.

# Take Action: Sign Faith Letter Supporting Statehood for D.C.

A group of leaders from many faiths in and around Washington D.C. have come together to advocate for D.C. to become the 51st state in our nation. D.C. has more residents than two of the 50 states but lacks full representation in Congress despite paying full federal



taxes.

Legislation for D.C. Statehood passed the U.S. House of Representatives on April 22nd and is now headed for consideration in the U.S. Senate, where it already has 46 cosponsors. We invite our members and friends to support this cause by <u>signing this letter to Senate</u> leadership.

These bills are part of a Climate Crisis
Policy (see below) package being promoted
by Metro New York Catholic Climate
Movement and other environmental
advocacy groups. Panelists will highlight the



importance of five Congressional bills from a faith perspective and their impact on farmers, U.S. agricultural policy, and environmental justice while addressing climate change.

## Take Action: Take The Earth Bill Pledge

We have mentioned before our endorsement of the <u>Climate Crisis Policy</u> (CCP) organization which is working to promote legislation addressing climate change. The proposed bills pertain to agricultural and land management practices, fossil fuels, plastics pollution, pesticides, manufacturing practices, and environmental justice. There is very detailed information regarding this legislation and the opportunity to Adopt-a-District by meeting with Congressional legislators on the <u>CCP website</u>.



Climate Crisis Policy also supports The Earth Bill which calls for a 100% clean renewable energy standard, prioritizes 100% Renewable Agriculture practices and will be a companion bill to other environmental legislation. They would like to get The Earth Bill, currently being drafted, into the American Jobs Act by July 4th, 2021. This is probably the most critical climate decision the Biden administration will make, and will dictate whether we stop our current greenhouse gas pollution fast enough to stop global warming at 1.5°C.
