## All Saints Day Begins a Campaign in Support of Black Candidates for Sainthood

Today the Catholic Church celebrates All Saints Day commemorating all the saints of the church, both known and unknown, who have attained heaven. This year, we bring to your attention a movement to honor the six African Americans from the United States who are candidates for sainthood.



Beginning with Mass at St. Ann Church in Baltimore MD, (tonight at 7pm ET), the St. Ann Church Social Justice Committee is launching a national letter writing campaign to create a groundswell of awareness of the Six Black Candidates for Sainthood. Letters to Pope Francis will be made available at the Mass today alongside a request for people across the country to engage with the effort by signing onto a letter and mailing it to St. Ann Roman Catholic Church at 528 E 22nd St, Baltimore, MD 21218. For more information on these candidates, the social justice committee recommends <u>Black</u> <u>Catholics on the Road to Sainthood</u>, by Michael R. Heinlein which is the first book to explore the lives of the six Black Catholics from the United States whose causes are under formal consideration by the Catholic Church for canonization. Including biographies and personal reflections from diverse contributors, this book shows how these six men and women provide a model of holiness for all Catholics and people of good will.

# New Report from Human Rights First Highlights Dangers of Title 42

The "Title 42" policy enacted by the Trump Administration misuses public health authority to violate refugee law, block asylum at U.S. ports of entry, and expel people seeking refuge to danger. This policy and others like the "Remain in Mexico" or MPP are still in place and continue to be used to turn



away asylum seekers and put migrants and refugees in danger. Last week Bishop Seitz of El Paso <u>released a statement</u> denouncing the continued use of these policies and urging the Biden Administration to end them immediately.

Our good friends at Human Rights First have published a report titled, "<u>Illegal and Inhumane</u>" which highlights the increase of kidnappings and attacks on people blocked or expelled under Title 42 since President Biden took office.

The U.S. government recently announced that it would lift restrictions on non-essential travel at the border, allowing vaccinated individuals with "appropriate documentation" to enter the United States. This is hypocritical considering it is in direct opposition to the Title 42 ban of people requesting life-saving asylum protections. You can download the entire report here.

Our allies at the Black Alliance for Just Immigration have developed this action alert which we urge you to use to **continue pressuring our elected officials** to end the use of these unjust policies.

Franciscan Action Network has been blessed with several recent additions to our <u>Board of Directors</u> which we would like to take a moment to introduce to you.


