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
Reflection Date: April 3, 2022 - Fifth Sunday of Lent

The Challenge of Rationality and Grasping at Infinity

I love the challenging bits of the Bible. The reading for the <u>5th Sunday in Lent in the Episcopal lectionary</u> has one such challenge in John 12:3:

Mary took a pound of costly perfume made of pure nard, anointed Jesus' feet, and wiped them with her hair. The house was filled with the fragrance of the perfume. Judas asked: "Why was this perfume not sold for three hundred denarii and the money given to the poor?" Jesus said, "Leave her alone. She bought it so that she might keep it for the day of my burial. You always



have the poor with you, but you do not always have me."

Quite honestly, Judas' question makes sense. He is being totally rational. But it is a very limited form of rationality.

Our faith demands that we stretch ourselves to see and feel and understand in ways that are far beyond our limited view of creation and humanity. We can only do this with God's help, for God is the only one who has a view of infinity. God is the only one who sees the infinite connections and cause/effect relationships which are the web of life itself. Mere human rationality, however well intentioned, is not going to really help. Yes, it may help for a short time. Yes, it may help a few people. But God's perspective, which must become our perspective, is to grasp infinity. I have two points to elaborate upon based upon these initial musings. One, how do we use our God-given rationality correctly? Second, how do we grasp infinity so we can at least attempt to see truth as God does?

Pope John Paul II says the following in his encyclical "Faith & Reason":

"Faith and reason are like two wings on which the human spirit rises to the contemplation of truth; and God has placed in the human heart a desire to know the truth - in a word, to know himself - so that, by knowing and loving God, men and women may also come to the fullness of truth about themselves."

In other words, pure reason without faith will probably lead us astray. Faith is the "salt" that enlivens Reason and gives it a good taste. It may be invisible, like the salt that dissolves in a good soup, but without it, the soup - and the solution you find to any problem by Reason alone - has no flavor. Your solution will have either limited success or create unintended consequences which actually make things worse. An example of that is our current form of nuclear power: yes, it gives us lots of electricity without greenhouse gasses which is very good, but it also creates radioactive waste and huge clean-up costs for which we still have no long term solution.

As for trying to grasp infinity, I recommend geometry and poetry and flowers. I am teaching students the geometry of the infinite by having them draw shapes such as the Harris spiral shown in the photo – which is an example of an infinitely repeating basic form called a fractal. You can find infinity in poetry too, most famously in the lines of William Blake:

To see a World in a Grain of Sand And a Heaven in a Wild Flower, Hold Infinity in the palm of your hand And Eternity in an hour.

Finally, you can grasp God's infinite mercy, wisdom and beauty in a flower. Stare into it. Be lost in it. Become one with it. And then you too will know, deep in your bones, that you too are part of the infinite. Then you too have a chance to appreciate what Mary did by wiping Jesus' feet with nard and do the same to those around you.
