

Ways to take Action:


- 1. **Make a call tomorrow, May 17** to both of your Senators. Use this <u>call-in script</u> from the good people at Welcome With Dignity.

- 3. **Send an Email.** Church World Service <u>developed this action</u> to **urge Congress to reject anti-asylum policies** and invest in humane welcome.
