Discipleship Demands

What is a just society and how are we called to bring it about? Jesus challenges us as he calls the disciples to bring healing and liberation to those in need. The readings for the <u>11th</u> <u>Sunday in Ordinary Time</u> are clear: we too are disciples on the journey, and like the twelve, we are called to go to those who are lost and bring the good news to them. Jesus sent the disciples to the lost sheep of the house of Israel, instructing them to make the proclamation: "The kingdom of Image by Constance Kowalik from Pixabay



heaven is at hand. Cure the sick, raise the dead, cleanse lepers, drive out demons. Without cost you have received; without cost you are to give."

Discipleship involves mission. Matthew uses two images to indicate that discipleship implies mission: people are like sheep without a shepherd and like a harvest that needs laborers to get the work done. There is much work to be done but very few who are willing to do the work. When we answer the call to become a follower of the Lord, this call involves being and doing. It does not mean we are to just sit back and do nothing. It does not mean we are to allow others to do the work while we watch and pray. Missionary discipleship, as Pope Francis calls us to, is being in service to the people of God. Pope Francis notes that "every Christian is a missionary to the extent that he or she has encountered the love of God in Christ Jesus..." If we have encountered the love of God in Christ Jesus, then we are to extend that same love to one another, especially in service to those most in need.

Discipleship demands our full attention and intention to be at the service to the people of God. Pope Francis considers this calling to be the key characteristic of the life of the Church in the world and of the lives of all those in the Church. He presents a new understanding of who we are and what we do as the people of God. Doing the works of mercy in your community – feeding, sheltering, and visiting those in need – can more than fulfill your duty to discipleship. Begin with prayer and discernment, asking God what is yours to do. Then listen for the response. See what opens up to you; see what opportunities present themselves in your immediate environment. And then set about the business of going forth in action. As the saying goes, "pray then move your feet!"

In a world plagued by addiction, poverty, war and violence, Jesus still sees us as lost sheep in need of a shepherd. Discipleship demands us to tend to the harvest. And what is the harvest? The sick, the dead, the lepers and those possessed by the demons of the world. Just as Jesus' heart was moved with pity for the people who were troubled and abandoned, we too must be moved with pity and compassion for those who go without each and every day. And just as Jesus called the twelve by name, so too he calls us by name to go out and proclaim that the kingdom of heaven is at hand. Do you believe this? Then, proclaim it boldly!
