Renewing the Mind During Season of Creation

"Do not conform yourselves to this age but be transformed by the renewal of your mind." (Rom 12:2) The readings for the 22nd Sunday in Ordinary Time are fitting as we celebrate the first Sunday of the Ecumenical Season of Creation. This celebration, dedicated to praying and responding together to the cry of creation, begins each year on September 1, the World Day of Prayer for Creation, and ends on October 4, the Feast Day of St. Francis of Assisi, the patron of animals and ecology.



Pope Francis, in his message for the Season of Creation, invites each of us to be transformed by the renewal of our "hearts, lifestyles, and public policies in an attempt to heal our only home," and, in the words of this year's theme for the celebration, to "let justice and peace flow." As I write this, the Atlantic Ocean is reaching hot-tub temperature, and parts of the United States are experiencing record heat (again!), causing public health concerns. Floods, droughts, and wildfires are devastating many areas of the world. The CEO of a major airline recently warned that because of climate change, travelers should brace for even more of the delayed and canceled flights that have made flying so miserable lately.

"What profit would there be for one to gain the world and forfeit his life?" (MT 16:26). Often, prioritizing profits over caring for creation, including other human beings, has been a driver of environmental devastation and violence. Think of the water crisis in Flint, Michigan, the greenhouse gas emissions from big oil companies, massive global deforestation, and the violence, war, and destruction due to the extraction of minerals.

Our culture pressures us to "conform [ourselves] to this age" (Rom. 12:2) and "think not as God does, but as human beings" (MT 16:23). Pope Francis addresses our individual consumption and the misuse as well as "othering" of God's creation as he urges us "to cooperate with God in his ongoing creation through positive choices...using resources with moderation and a joyful sobriety, disposing and recycling waste, and making greater use of available products and services that are environmentally and socially responsible" and so to renew "our relationship with creation so that we no longer see it as an object to be exploited but cherish it instead as a sacred gift from our creator." Our Creator God has given each of us the capacity to creatively do what is ours to faithfully steward, protect, and affirm the sacredness of all life. FAN's ongoing work on Environmental Justice is a good example.

The election was held on August 20 and anti-corruption candidate Bernardo Arévalo was elected with nearly 60% of the votes.
