### Fairness or Justice?

As the oldest child of four, I was sometimes blamed for squabbles I didn't initiate because, as the oldest, "You should know better." "It's not fair!" was my complaint. Over the years, my sense of fairness evolved or ripened into a call for justice for others. In Matthew's Gospel parable of the laborers in the vineyard for the <a href="25th Sunday">25th Sunday in Ordinary Time</a>, maybe the landowner's distribution of wages wasn't really "fair" because some laborers worked longer hours than others, but it was "just" because the landowner didn't cheat the workers who had agreed on their payment, opting to distribute wages with generous compassion. This parable actualizes the truth in Isaiah 55: "For my thoughts are not your thoughts, nor are your ways my ways," says the Lord.

If I had my way the world would be swept clean of poverty, hunger, war, gun violence, racism, ecological destruction, human trafficking and other injustices. Of course, God asks me what I'm doing to help alleviate all this suffering and transform injustice to justice, violence to peace. My way might be to pray away all the hate, cruelty, and injustice, but God's way is to engage me, all of us, in acting to help God's "kingdom (to) come on earth as it is in heaven." God's way is to rely on the "yes" of humans to help accomplish the mission of Jesus Christ.

Today's ecological destruction is a prime example of human ways not being God's way. God's magnificent, abundant creation is critically threatened by climate crises mostly brought on by human indifference and misbehavior. This week ends Season of Creation 2023, "Let Justice Flow Like a River," but the work continues with even greater urgency. Acknowledging this urgency, Pope Francis has announced that on October 4th, he will release a new Apostolic Exhortation on the Environment, a follow-up to his 2015 encyclical "Laudato Si, on Care for Our Common Home." We Franciscans are delighted that this release coincides with the feast of St. Francis of Assisi. While we don't yet know any details, we do know that recently Pope Francis referred to ecological destruction and climate injustice as a "terrible world war." (General Audience August 30, 2023) We eagerly anticipate the release of this Apostolic Exhortation.

## Support DACA Recipients

Last year, the Fifth Circuit decided to partially halt DACA and returned the case to Judge Hanen of the U.S. District Court of the Southern District of Texas for review of the new DACA rule proposed by the Department of Homeland Security (DHS). Last week, Judge Hanen ruled against DACA and called to terminate the program, again. Now, the future of DACA



TEXT HOME IS HERE TO 787-57 returns to the hands of the Fifth Circuit court. Millions of undocumented folks have already been left unprotected, but hundreds of thousands more are at risk if the Fifth Circuit decides to end renewals.
