# Seeking a Christ-like Response to the Ugliness of War

What a heavy few weeks this has been for the world, since the October 7 attack in Israel and ensuing events. Although the readings for the <u>30th Sunday in Ordinary Time</u> were chosen long before this conflict began, the selections are providential and speak powerfully to the conflict in Israel and Palestine. Before you begin reading, I invite you to take a deep breath, reflect on your innermost thoughts and heartaches, and come to this reflective reading with the full breadth of your heart's peace.

## The first reading (Ex. 22:20-26) calls us to

remember the divine humanity in each of us and our call, especially as Franciscans, to an empathetic response to suffering. God has uniquely created, shaped, and molded each of our souls; each one of infinitely more value than we can fathom. Nationality and religious tradition cannot take away from this value, especially to our Creator, but rather adds richness to our human dialogue and expands our minds to our anthropogenic global reality.

The second reading (1 Thes 1:5c-10) from Paul reminds us of this globalized reality and how, in the present age, it is not just the people with whom we share walls or property lines, but people of every nation who are our neighbors. Here we speak of God as our "rock of refuge" and "deliverer from the coming wrath." We must confide in God to guide us to empathy for our neighbors, and act in advance of these trials of "coming wrath," seeing the humanity in each person to prevent further violence. As He delivered us to peace, let us be deliverers of that same peace to all our neighbors.

St Francis was called to rebuild the church, and for those who follow his example this means preserving the church's foundation. The foundation, our community of global neighbors, is a diverse aggregate and sacred in its creation by our Father. We must preserve one another's lives, no matter the soil on which our feet land, and mourn over the soil of the graves where those who have died to violence rest.

The gospel reading from Matthew (22:34-40) calls us to love our neighbors as ourselves with empathy and a commitment to a Christ-like response. Christ meets us where we are, even in the ugliness of war; He sees hope in us and our actions. May we imitate His overflowing love and undying humility in our work to seek peace in the world, wherever it may be needed, and to approach these situations with hearts full of His Word.

FAN joined more than two dozen national Catholic organizations that sent a <u>letter</u> to President Biden, urging him to take the necessary steps to de-escalate the conflict





Michele Dunne offered this comment: "Franciscan Action Network offers its heartfelt condolences and solidarity to Israelis and Palestinians in their tremendous suffering, and calls on the US government to take steps to foster peace and a rapid end to the violence. We pray for the immediate release of Israeli hostages held by Hamas as well as immediate cessation of Israeli bombing campaigns, which are taking a terrifying human toll in Gaza. We call on all parties to remember that further escalation, such as a ground invasion of Gaza, will only take them further away from the

peace and reconciliation that Palestinians and Israelis ultimately need to reach."

# Webinar: Working for Environmental Justice in Louisiana

Please join us **TODAY**, **October 24 at 4pm ET** (**1pm PT**) to learn how environmental activists in Louisiana are challenging the petrochemical industries in the area named "Cancer Alley," an 85-mile stretch of land along the Mississippi River that has more than 150 petrochemical plants and refineries in areas where the majority of residents are both Black and lower income. Our speakers will be **Sharon and Shamyra Lavigne**, mother-daughter activists of RISE St. James, a faith-based, grassroots organization in Louisiana that works to defeat the proliferation of petrochemical industries in St. James Parish, Louisiana, where 32

Related to this, Interfaith Power and Light is hosting a sign-on letter they will deliver to the State Department in advance of COP28, an international climate summit held this year in Dubai from November 30-December 12. # **Results of Congressional Visits**

FAN's first <u>Franciscan Justice Leadership</u> <u>Conference</u> was developed with a goal of encouraging participants, including young adults, to advocate on issues that concern them, both locally in their communities and nationally on Capitol Hill.

On Monday, October 16, more than 60 of our conference participants went to Capitol Hill in Washington, D.C. to tell our members of Congress how much we care about our common home and environmental justice. We met with 15 offices in the House and Senate raising our concerns about two pieces of legislation: the **Justice for Black Farmers Act** of the Farm Bill (S. 96, H.R. 1167) and the **Environmental Justice for All Act** (S. 919, H.R. 1705). Each of these bills reflects our moral principle that all people have the right to good nutrition, pure air, clean water, and a healthful environment.




So far two Representatives' offices have informed us they **will cosponsor** at least one of these bills. This action was taken as a direct result of the visits made by our groups and is a terrific example of what can happen when we raise our concerns with our elected officials. Our voices matter!
