"The greatest among you must be your servant"

In the gospel for the <u>31st Sunday in Ordinary Time</u>, Jesus is critical of leaders. Jesus is talking about how well they live and think of themselves as superior to many others. Has much changed? Are we not trusting, believing, and supporting all that we are told?

Several phrases stand out: "For they preach but they do not practice;" "all their works are performed to be seen;" and "they love places of honor." Yet all of us need to be humble before God.



Years ago, I had the honor to meet and speak

with Dom Helder Camara, a bishop from Brazil who chose to live with the poor. His most famous quote is, "when I feed the poor they call me a saint. But when I ask why they are hungry or poor, I am called a communist." He was so humble and had a heart for those who struggled with providing for their family's needs.

Jesus, surely, is still calling us to be humble and to embrace those who ask for help rather than simply talking about issues or turning our heads away from them. Our problem is that we all seem to be weary. We prefer to have someone else do the work. So we walk away. We pray for those who are needy or involved in a disaster but do not take action to change the policies to address the problem. It's easier to simply keep praying, but to pray and do nothing else is to say that this is God's problem.

In the past, Franciscan Action Network held a fundraising dinner for our supporters and those with whom we work. It usually involved a few presentations and a table of food to share. This year the FAN staff had a wonderful inspired idea to change our focus and instead, to serve a meal to those in need. The response was great and the feedback we received was incredibly positive. (Thank you to those who contributed and of course if you did not do so at the time, we are still gladly accepting donations!)

This is the type of humility Jesus is calling for in the gospel, the humility of a servant.


Pray-In at the White House for Israel-Gaza Ceasefire

Letter Sign on Urging Action on Family Visa Backlog

Approximately 4 million people are stranded abroad awaiting a visa to join their family members in the U.S. The U.S. Administration can take action now to reclaim unused green cards and provide parole for people in family-based green card backlogs as well as expand family reunification parole programs.

The Hearts@Home Campaign coordinated by Value our Families has developed a sign-on letter for faith leaders to urge the



Administration to take swift action to facilitate the reunification of families who have been trapped in visa backlogs for years. Read the letter in full by clicking here. The deadline to sign on is **November 8**.

Urge Congress to Fund Refugee & Newcomer Inclusion

As legislators continue to negotiate federal funding, please consider urging them to equip our communities with the resources needed to help newcomers integrate and thrive. On October 20, the Administration recognized this imperative by sending Congress a request for supplemental funding that included significant resources for vital refugee and humanitarian assistance.

Conflict, persecution, and climate change have resulted in an unprecedented 110+ million people displaced around the world. Call on Congress to restore essential benefits to arriving Ukrainians



and Afghans, invest in welcoming policies, and reduce reliance on immigrant detention, deportation, and border militarization.

Franciscan Justice Circles Updates

E. Wisconsin FJC members are involved in local and state advocacy efforts including improving the conditions and oversight of affordable housing units in the city of Milwaukee which recently had a win; contacting members of Congress in support of Farm Bill including the importance of proper nutrition for at-risk pregnant women; advocating for Milwaukee County to adopt a resolution that would make it policy that natural areas and systems have a right to exist, in line



with the "Rights of Nature" movement, which came to pass this month making Milwaukee County the first in the state; and promoting the "We All Belong" campaign against the rise of "christian" nationalism.

The **Mid-Hudson Valley FJC** members have been reaching out to their leaders on a variety of issues including: urging Congress to act on the Assault Weapons Ban of 2023; awareness raising on care for our common home; interfaith peace events; contacting their members of Congress to call for a ceasefire in the Middle East conflict; sending cards of condolence, prayer and sympathy to local Jewish and Muslim houses of worship.

The **Connecticut-Rhode Island FJC** has kept moving forward in their pursuit of continual conversion after reading Laudato Si' by delving into The Earth Charter and continuing to share and come up with personal and local actions, especially ones that can be taken within one's church community.
