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Reflection Date: December 24, 2023 - Fourth Sunday of Advent & Christmas Eve

Doing God's Will

What does obedience to God's will look like? The Fourth Sunday of Advent readings show us that it requires emptying, completely emptying oneself of priorities and worries and giving oneself to the will of God. Francis of Assisi surely was inspired by Mary's example of obedience when he shocked everyone in his community by renouncing his worldly goods and family wealth to embrace a life of poverty and live the Gospel as best he could.



Doing God's will can be scary,

uncomfortable, and countercultural. However, like Mary showed, as did Sts. Francis and Clare in their own time, we need not fear. Instead, we must make straight the path to God, as the prophet Isaiah urged, by letting go of that which deters us from following God's will and accepting the invitation to embrace self-giving love each and every day. In the gospel reading we have a wonderful example to follow in Mary. Upon being approached by the angel messenger, Mary let go of her previous understanding of what was possible, let go of concerns about how her community would treat her, let go of her own plans and her own wishes---all to trust in God's will.

In "<u>A Franciscan Spirituality of Discernment</u>," Thomas Nairn, OFM explains that discerning the will of God requires that we be silent in order to listen to God and others, in whom God dwells. What might be getting in the way of our own listening? What obstacles stop us short from truly listening to our sisters and brothers?

For if we open ourselves up to receive what our sisters and brothers are feeling and experiencing—drinking lead-contaminated water due to outdated infrastructure, waking up each morning in the crossfire of war, experiencing regular discrimination in their communities, being anxious about their safety at school or at the store, needing to uproot their families to seek safer conditions and better economic opportunities in another land, suffering at the hands of another—then it's not the end of the story. Deep true listening, as exemplified by Mary as well as Sts. Francis and Clare, means we have to *go forth*, we have to *act* because that is what genuine self-giving love does.

Fortified by Mary's example of not being afraid to do God's will no matter what others may think or the change in plans it may require, we must *go forth* doing God's will in our own lives. We are called to *act* in small and big ways by first listening to others and creation, discerning communally where God is calling us, then humbly doing the will of our good and gracious God with love, mercy, peace and good will.
