## Listening for the Voice of God

In the first reading for the <u>Second Sunday in Ordinary Time</u>, we hear the story of Samuel, a young boy, probably 12 years of age, living away from home, sleeping in the Temple. In the ancient world it was believed that someone sleeping in the Temple might receive a message from God. I doubt that young Samuel was expecting to hear the voice of God, but he did hear a voice, not just once, but three times.

Each time he heard that voice, Samuel ran to the priest Eli, and answered with the Hebrew word "Hineni," often translated as "Here I am." Samuel was not saying that he was simply present, like answering a roll call in class. "Hineni" meant an

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openness to not only hear but also to respond to God's call. When Eli realized that Samuel was hearing the voice of God, he instructed Samuel to respond, "Speak, Lord, for your servant is listening." Eli challenged young Samuel to go beyond merely *hearing* the voice of God to *listening* to the word of God.

In the opening talk of the 2023 Synod retreat in Rome, Dominican Fr. Timothy Radcliffe spoke of the moral obligation to listen: "But we will only have a voice if we first listen. God calls to people by name: Abraham, Moses, Samuel. They reply with the beautiful Hebrew word *Hineni*, 'Here I am.' We are created to listen to the Lord, and to each other. As they say, we have two ears but only one mouth."

We need silence and interior stillness to listen deeply. Listening provides insight into the person we encounter that we might not otherwise gain. It means we are not preparing an answer while the person is speaking, but are allowing the other to present thoughts uninterrupted. That level of listening opens us to what we cannot imagine. It gives space to feel the presence of God and to hear the promptings of the Holy Spirit.

As people of faith, our call is to listen, truly listen, in our increasingly polarized and divided world. To listen for the gaps and divergences that help us to move from the "I" to the "we" while still honoring uniqueness. To listen for the voices of those most often left out, those who are pushed to the margins. To listen to those who feel invisible and unheard. To listen to the cry of the earth, which is intertwined with the cry of the poor. Finally, we are called to use that *listening* to discern the will of God and to act accordingly in light of the gospel.

For those who have been exiled from their homeland because of political unrest or violence, God, hear our prayer.

God of Solidarity, Open our eyes to see, our ears to hear, and our voices to sing the many praises of you and of those who are on the margins of our world. May we love others, even when love is hard to find. May we seek justice, even when it is against the norm. May we seek communion, even when we want to be our own individual self. May we live in solidarity in all that we do, all that we are, and all that we are becoming.

#### **Gun Law Scorecards from Giffords and Everytown**

GIFFORDS Law Center to Prevent Gun Violence recently launched their <u>Annual Gun Law Scorecard 2023 edition</u> where all 50 states are ranked and graded on their gun laws.



It was found that states with strong gun laws—As and Bs—are also the states that tend to have fewer gun deaths. Gun laws are saving lives right now, across the country. Check out the 2023 Gun Law Scorecard and see how your state stacks up.
