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Reflection Date: January 28, 2024 - Fourth Sunday of Ordinary Time

Harden not your MINDS

As we begin another day in another undoubtedly busy week, I invite you to take a deep breath, slow your heart, and feel the existence of God around you.

The psalm response for the **fourth** Sunday in Ordinary Time, "If today you hear his voice, harden not your hearts," (Ps 95:1-2, 6-7, 7-9) is always inspiring. Especially as we enter another tumultuous and anxiety-ridden election year, we hear the call to step back and listen to the silence of our hearts.

Many of us know that God's timeline or path for us is never what we expect, but usually results in a better outcome than we could have imagined. We are warned, however, that to be God's servant means to be a constant listener, not to listen only when we are feeling especially anxious. To do this, we must open our hearts to be guided by a God bigger than ourselves and to let our own thoughts and opinions be influenced by God's priority - a better world for everyone. I'm sure that He knows how difficult and frightening it is to be this vulnerable with anyone, let alone our Maker, and to let our egos melt into the background. In the Second Reading (1 Cor 7:32-35) we are told that this anxiety is the very last thing God wants us to feel! However, it serves as a reminder of how our need to turn and listen to Him, lifting up our struggles, and allowing a "lightening the yoke," can be a sort of eustress - a healthy stress. The first reading (Dt 18:15-20) tells us that we cannot be positive agents of change in this world unless we listen to God's constant pull at our hearts.

It is (rightfully) difficult to jump to the challenges God gives us. We all feel busy and rushed to achieve our goals and maintain the status quo, yet here He is calling us to do better than "our best" and to go into the world and actively call for the change needed to end suffering, hunger, homelessness, violence, and injustice. It can be inconvenient! I've heard from many people that "nothing easy is ever worth working for," and in this context, I take this to mean literally that God is asking us to take the time out of our already stressful lives to listen to Him, rise to these challenges and, in the end, rest in the sleep of peace, knowing that we listened and acted when it was difficult or uncomfortable, and did the most to give our world the peace it deserves. We are called to rise to the challenge of our God and what a noble one that is!

Urge Congress to Save Asylum

Sacred scripture and Catholic Social Teaching compel us to welcome and serve newcomers, a core ministry of many Franciscan communities. People seeking safety in the U.S. are not political pawns and policies that directly impact






them need to prioritize their humanity and dignity. Please <u>urge Congress to reject the anti-asylum policies</u> being considered in ongoing funding negotiations on foreign aid packages. <u>This editable letter template</u> comes from Justice for Immigrants of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB). Only when we see our shared humanity in those who seek better lives for themselves and their children can we adopt a border policy that enshrines our national values. Take action for the Farm Bill

The Farm Bill is the largest piece of federal legislation for food and farming, impacting access to nutritious food for millions of people in the United States. Congress approved a temporary extension of the 2018 Farm Bill in November 2023 and is now considering full reauthorization. Urge your congressional representative to pass a Farm Bill that increases funding for TEFAP (The Emergency Food Assistance Program), simplifies eligibility and enrollment in SNAP (Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program), and protects the purchasing power of SNAP so that benefits align with grocery prices. Farm bill support can



help U.S. agriculture to lead the world in climate-smart innovation and to build cleaner and more reliable energy solutions for rural America. Ask Congress to Pass a Strong Farm Bill.

It's never easy to have to share bad news. The staff of FAN is mourning the tragic loss of Ryan Realbuto (pictured), age 23, who was fatally shot last week in Washington D.C. in an attempted robbery. Originally from Pittsford, New York, Ryan was a participant in FAN's Franciscan Justice Leadership Conference last October. A 2023 St. Bonaventure University graduate, Ryan moved to D.C last year as part of the Capuchin Franciscan Volunteer Corps and was assigned to work at a local high school helping at-risk students in a work-study program.

This week is <u>National Gun Violence Survivors</u> <u>Week</u>. Gun violence in any form can leave a lasting impact, hurting not only the victim, but as Ryan's mother <u>put it</u>, "It shatters a community." Mrs. Realbuto remembers her son as someone "who was passionate about giving back." During



this time of grief and loss, we join our hearts with all those mourning a life lost to gun violence as well as those who have survived and carry the trauma with them. In honor of Ryan's life and all the souls whose light was cut short, we recommit to being channels of peace, love and justice.
