Lean Toward Light

Days are growing longer. Daylight Saving
Time begins Sunday with longer evening light
and darker mornings. In the gospel for the
fourth Sunday of Lent, John says "the light
came into the world, but people preferred
darkness to light . . .But whoever lives the
truth comes to the light, so that his works may
be clearly seen as done in God."

There is good darkness and evil darkness, good light and destructive light. Nights are

dark so that our bodies can rest and sleep; there is darkness of the womb where human life grows and darkness of soil where seed plants take root. There is deliberate darkness of mind, heart, and spirit which covets power, wealth, and hate erupting into violence. There is light of dawn, sunshine to nurture growing things, light of candles, fireworks, and lightbulbs. There is the frightening light of exploding bombs in Ukraine and the Middle East, searing destructive light of atomic and hydrogen bombs dropped on Japan, light of forest fires devouring forests and homes. May we be grateful for good darkness and light, and engage in works grounded in Truth.

John reminds us (3:16) that "God so loved the world that he gave his only Son . . .to be the Light of the world." How do we come to Jesus, THE Light of the world? By living the truth, by being motivated by love. It sounds clear and simple, but in a world, in a country, where lies and misinformation often obscure truth, where hatred and fear can poison the atmosphere, the way is challenging. As we continue our Lenten journey, may we lean toward the Light, discern and live truth, and ask for grace to love even those who would have us dwell in darkness.

Bread for the World's Offering of Letters this weekend will again focus on aspects of the Farm Bill, including equity for Puerto Ricans, who do not have access to SNAP benefits although they are US citizens. Instead, Puerto Rico has the Nutrition Assistance Program, a block grant that has lower, capped levels. Congress should give authority to the government of Puerto Rico to operate SNAP. Ask your senators and representatives to support the Puerto Rico Nutrition Fairness Act (HR 253/S949) and the Closing the Meal Gap Act (HR 3037/S 1336). Capitol Switchboard: 202-224-3121.

Dialogue with Palestinian and Israeli Bereaved Families for Peace


On Thursday, March 14 at 3pm ET (12pm PT)

industry in many countries, coupled with the global demand for cheap seafood, creates lawless conditions at sea under which maritime trafficking is allowed to flourish. All you need to do is fill out your information, post a stamp, and drop them in the mail.

Recording: Telling the Truth about the Border

On February 21, the Center for Migration Studies of New York (CMS) hosted a webinar and discussion, Telling the Truth about the Border: A Humane Vision for Border Management. Experts from the US-Mexico border spoke about the realities along the border and the human consequences of US border enforcement policy. They also reacted to a recent failed border agreement in Congress, and offered more humane and effective ways to manage migration at the US-Mexico border moving forward.



Speakers included the Most Reverend Mark J. Seitz, Bishop of El Paso; Joanna Williams, Executive Director, Kino Border Initiative; Guerline M. Jozef, Founder and Executive Director,

With a limit of three minutes to speak, she was able to report on the success rate of

intervention programs in directly reducing gun violence in hard hit neighborhoods and advocate for a local violence prevention center. This type of advocacy can be intimidating but Sr. Maryann got help with preparation and on what to expect on the day of testifying from a state-level group, CT Against Gun Violence.
