Collaborating Across Faiths

In the readings for the <u>16th Sunday in Ordinary Time</u>, we hear about the need to unify our efforts as we are but sheep, lost without a shepherd.

It's often been said to me that work is best done together rather than individually. For example, climate change, systemic racism and poverty, and the inhumane treatment of migrants are such large and overwhelming issues to tackle by oneself, but become less so when taking action with friends. I take special notice that the scripture for the first reading (Jer 23:1-6) mentions that we all need a *shepherd* to lead us to God, which to me emphasizes the importance of collaborating across faiths albeit with different shepherds. For Christians, this shepherd is Jesus, for Muslims this shepherd is Muhammad, for Buddhists

this shepherd is the Buddha. Together we can follow our shepherds to coalesce our God-given talents and gifts into a reality of justice. As civil rights icon Martin Luther King, Jr. said, "We must all learn to live together as brothers or we will all perish together as fools. We are tied together in the single garment of destiny, caught in an inescapable network of mutuality."

Working together is easier said than done, but working together across faiths is a valiant challenge. A critical lesson for me in my faith journey was balancing reflection and discernment with faithful action. In the Gospel of Mark (6:30-34), before Jesus encouraged them to rest, "The apostles gathered together with Jesus and reported all they had done and taught." I was moved to action through faith by this statement. A shepherd alone can only do so much; we must be God's action-taking hands in the world together with our fellow disciples. How much more beautiful it must be to the shepherds that their sheep *choose* to care for the rest of the flock out of their own free will?

You have already taken the first step to become a part of a community of faithful action-takers through receiving and reading this newsletter. Perhaps the next step of discernment is joining a Franciscan community of justice seekers through a <u>Franciscan Justice Circle</u>? By joining a Justice Circle, you can learn more about what it means to understand and truly love our neighbor and listen to them, and to be moved to action and advocate for our collective God-given rights and human needs. How truly inspiring it is to me that there are thousands of us together as a flock of Franciscans working to be the change the world needs.

With 37 total pilgrims, the trip was a beautiful opportunity to walk in the footsteps of St. Francis and St. Clare, peacemakers in their own time whose courageous nonviolence, compassion for others, kinship with creation, and work for peace and reconciliation continue to inspire Franciscans worldwide in their personal spiritual journeys.



The Connecticut - Rhode Island Franciscan Justice Circle recently signed

on to an open letter to the Connecticut delegation of the US House of Representatives as part of a coalition of faith leaders and faith groups in CT, asking the members to prevent nuclear war by supporting H.R 77, Embracing the goals and provisions of the Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons. "Experts are sounding the alarm that the risk of nuclear war is greater than it has ever been since the Atomic bombings of Japan," the letter stated, noting the taxpayer dollars spent each year to maintain and upgrade the country's nuclear weapon arsenal as well as the environmental harm from testing and maintenance of nuclear weapons.
