Reflection Date: September 29, 2024 - Twenty-sixth Sunday in Ordinary Time

#### **Gospel Sacrifice**

In the gospel reading for the <u>Twenty-sixth Sunday in Ordinary Time</u>, we hear some stern words from our Lord: "If your hand causes you to sin, cut it off.... If your foot causes you to sin, cut it off.... And if your eye causes you to sin, pluck it out." Obviously, this is metaphorical language, and yet the meaning is clear: nothing must stand in the way of holiness and our relationship with God. Jesus' words this week speak to us about sacrifice. What are we willing to sacrifice to obtain the kingdom of God?



In times long past, sacrifice was the act of offering something to a deity in propitiation or appeasement or homage, especially the ritual slaughter of an animal or person. Thankfully, through the sacrifice of Jesus on the cross, we don't need such rituals in our times. Yet, the concept of sacrifice today is still valid as it means the act of giving up something highly valued for the sake of something else considered to have a greater value. For example, social activism often involves tremendous sacrifice.

The word *sacrifice*, from the Latin *to make sacred*, is a concept few of us want to entertain because it means we have to give something up, and not just *any* something, but something very dear to us. One of the hardest things to give up is our privilege. When we think about the marginalized, the immigrant, the poor and outcast, they are not only the "least of these," but they are our brothers and sisters. Yet, they remain the *least* because someone else is greater, and the one who is greater has the privilege they dare not part with.

The Letter of James is equally severe: "You have lived on earth in luxury and pleasure; you have fattened your hearts for the day of slaughter. You have condemned; you have murdered the righteous one; he offers you no resistance." Are we willing to risk discomfort in order to stand for justice and truth? In the pursuit of social justice, individuals often face moments where they must choose between remaining comfortable and taking action against injustice. Jesus' metaphor of cutting off a hand or plucking out an eye can be seen as a call to remove the temptation to remain passive or indifferent in the face of injustice. The passage challenges us to recognize that true discipleship and spiritual growth often require us to step out of our comfort zones and confront issues that might be difficult or uncomfortable, to give up our privileged positions.

Advocacy for social justice frequently involves confronting uncomfortable truths about oneself and society. This might include acknowledging personal biases, systemic inequalities, or the ways in which one's own privilege contributes to the oppression of others. For example, a person might feel compelled to confront their own implicit biases about race or gender, recognizing that doing so is necessary to promote justice and equity. This kind of examination of self and society can be deeply uncomfortable, but it is essential for spiritual growth, the pursuit of justice, and a closer walk with the Lord. Just as Jesus urges the removal of anything that causes sin, we too are called to remove the blinders of comfort and complacency that prevent us from seeing and addressing injustice.

In our pursuit of holiness, let us commit to sacrificing some of our comforts for the daily care of those in need. For example, consider donating clothing to a homeless shelter in your area or creating blessing bags (a bag filled with everyday toiletry items) to distribute to the unsheltered.

## **Suggested Petitions:**

We lift up the marginalized, the excluded, migrants and refugees, the oppressed, and those who oppress them. We pray for those who have been cast aside by society, who live on the fringes and struggle to find acceptance and security. Comfort them in their pain, and grant them hope and resilience. May they find refuge in Your love and justice, and may their cries for dignity and fairness be heard. For all this, we pray...

#### **Gracious God,**

We ask for Your guidance as we seek to confront injustice in the world. Give us the wisdom to discern how we can best serve those in need, and the humility to listen to the cries of the poor and oppressed. Help us to be diligent in our pursuit of justice and fairness, and lead us in Your ways of righteousness. May we not grow weary in doing good, but remain steadfast in our commitment to Your will. Let our advocacy be grounded in Your love and truth.




## **Middle East Peace Activities**


