The Power of Relationships

In the first reading for the <u>Twenty-Seventh</u> <u>Sunday in Ordinary Time</u>, the very first line indicates the Lord's ideal situation for humans: "It is not good for man to be alone" (Gn 2:18). God wants humans to have other humans and creatures with whom to commune. In the second reading, St. Paul in his Letter to the Hebrews makes plain that Jesus and his followers "all have one origin. Therefore, he is not ashamed to call them brothers" (Heb 2:11). The gospel story of the Pharisees testing Jesus by asking about the law in regards to divorce is often used to discuss marriage. Taking all these readings combined, however, I



want to reflect on a theme with which Franciscans are deeply familiar: relationships.

From the beginning, Francis of Assisi emphasized relationships among his followers. They were to be friars, not monks. Friars live and work in a community of brothers, while the word monk suggests a solitary lifestyle, as the term is derived from the Greek word *monakus* meaning "alone." The reason that St. Francis preferred the title "brother" was simple; he truly saw himself as inherently related to all creatures, even nonhumans, as part of God's one family of creation.

If we truly believe we are inherently related to each other and to nature, how does that affect our actions? By building strong relationships, we are better able to understand one another. If we know the story of a person who is struggling, we can better support them through it. We are more willing to make sacrifices for "Sister Earth, our Mother" and her creatures when we are aware of how our actions impact their existence. It is through the power of our relationships with one another and nature that we strengthen the body of Christ in the world today.

For the last 12 years, I have had the honor and privilege to serve as communications coordinator for the Franciscan Action Network (FAN). As of this publication, I will be starting a new chapter in my career but I take with me all the relationships I have formed during my tenure. Through the years, I have had conversations with many people in our network and as I took time to get to know a little more about them, each person became more special to me. I consider the members of the staff and board of directors, both past and present, as my siblings. The relationships I have built through FAN are something I will cherish for years to come. I will always be a Franciscan at heart. I wish you all peace and all good.

Franciscan Justice Circle Updates

Members of the **Mid-Hudson Valley FJC** participated in the annual Peace Mass at St. Joseph's Church in New Paltz on Aug. 24, where immigration, climate change, poverty, gun violence, etc. were addressed. Information about how to contact governmental representatives and newspapers was made available and the main ideas on how to safely store firearms were distributed. In addition to sending letters to senators and their U.S. representative about the need to closely monitor glock switches, expand background checks, pass legislation on safe gun storage and address ghost guns, the Circle promotes peace efforts internationally. Members write letters in support of ceasefire efforts and an FJC member publicly witnesses in areas with pro-Palestinian and pro-Israel messages that there is a third way–peace, which can be a powerful message for all present who question where peace fits in.
