Finding Peace in Discomfort

The readings for the Thirty-third Sunday in Ordinary Time focus primarily on the Second Coming of Jesus. The line that stood out to me is the last line of the Gospel: “But of that day or hour, no one knows, neither the angels in heaven, nor the Son, but only the Father” (Mk 13:32). Nobody knows when Jesus will come again, except for God.

To many, including myself at first, that line can be disconcerting, especially when applied to a broader context. We don't know everything tomorrow will bring, let alone next week, month, or year. We might have some indicators so we can prepare, but no one knows exactly how things will go. That being said, there is a lot we can do. Rather than stewing in anxiety, discomfort, or any other negative emotion, we can take action.



While we might have a winner for the presidential election, there are still many that have yet to be called, and there is so much else that could still happen and change. Honestly, that terrifies me a bit, and it may terrify many of you, however, there are many things I have been able to do that give me some hope and peace despite this discomfort.

As a volunteer through the Franciscan Mission Service, I was lucky enough to be placed at FAN. Working at FAN and the many experiences that I have already give me hope that no matter how things turn out, there will always be good-hearted people seeking justice. In our [Franciscan Justice Leadership Conference](#) and at the various actions I have participated in, there are plenty of things working against the movements and people involved in them, and none of us know what will happen next, but regardless, we feel called to work for justice and will continue that work for as long as we can.

This Sunday's reading asks us to trust in God and His plan for us, and prepare accordingly. I believe that working for Gospel values and Catholic Social Teaching is a way to prepare for that plan, in addition to helping find peace in times of discomfort.

We look forward to working together with you, now and in the days ahead, as we find what is ours to do in the world.



Cicero faces many negative environmental impacts, for example, the city’s inaction on water infrastructure leading to flooding and a chemical manufacturing facility spewing air pollution. Activists have been pushing city and state officials to help Cicero with little response. We will focus on the interlocking injustices that cause environmental injustice in Cicero, what the activists have done to take legal action and gain the support of their faith communities, and what people outside of Chicago can do to help.

DACA getting ACA

Starting November 1, thousands of DACA recipients were finally able to enroll for healthcare through the Affordable Care Act (ACA) marketplaces, with coverage beginning as early as December. This enrollment period follows a new rule finalized in May by the Biden Administration, which offers the chance for over 100,000 previously uninsured DACA

recipients who have been excluded from accessing lifesaving healthcare coverage to finally be eligible to purchase and enroll in health insurance under the ACA.

As open enrollment kicks off, the Home is Here coalition strongly encourages DACA recipients needing healthcare coverage to enroll as soon as possible, as attacks aimed at ending this rule are ongoing. Currently, opponents in Kansas and 18 other states are attempting to block DACA recipients from accessing healthcare through the ACA in yet another cruel attempt to target and deny immigrants fundamental human rights. The case –[Kansas v. United States](#)– is currently in the appeals process in federal court.

Franciscan Justice Circle Updates

A [Franciscan Justice Circle](#) (FJC) connects Franciscan-hearted individuals looking to join with others locally to engage in social and environmental justice rooted in Franciscan spirituality.
