To Testify to the Truth

On the last weekend of the liturgical year, we celebrate <u>Christ the King Sunday</u>. Our reading from the Gospel of John takes us deep into the Passion week narrative between Jesus and Pilate, who represents the supreme authority of the Roman empire. Since Jesus' own nation and chief priests handed him over to the political authorities, Pilate asks, "What have you done?" and "Are you the king of the Jews?"

Though he is the one on trial and the defendant, Jesus speaks with authority in his interchange with Pilate. Instead of answering Pilate's questions,



Jesus offers an alternative to earthly kingship. "For this I was born, and for this I came into the world, to testify to the truth. Everyone who belongs to the truth listens to my voice." The kingdom of Jesus is unlike anything in this world. Worldly kings take power from others by winning battles or at least through diplomacy. Jesus neither fights nor allows his followers to do so. He insists on taking the path of truth and peace, essentially saying that he refuses, he rejects, the use of power or coercion to win the world to his kingdom.

"For this I came into the world, to testify to the truth." In a world struggling with what is true and what is fake, in a world deeply divided, we are reminded on Christ the King Sunday that the one who stands before Pilate is the Truth. When Jesus talks about truth he's not just talking about honesty or truthfulness. He's not saying he is merely here to say true things. He is the truth. If we want to participate in Christ's unworldly kingdom, his beloved community, we need but follow Jesus, the truth, the light that shines in the darkness. The irony is that truth is the only authority and power that Jesus wields.

Jesus models for us the way to speak the truth to power, a way to courageously call out injustice and demand peace, even as we maintain our integrity and remain rooted in the Truth.




Tonight: "Cicero, IL: Underwater and Under Pressure"

Cicero, IL is a majority-Latino city near Chicago that faces disproportionate exposure to environmental degradation. Cicero faces many negative environmental impacts, for example, the city's inaction on water infrastructure leading to flooding and a chemical manufacturing facility spewing air pollution. Activists have been pushing city and state officials to help Cicero with little response. We will focus on the interlocking injustices that cause environmental injustice in Cicero, what the activists have done to take legal action and gain the support of their faith communities, and what people outside of
