
# Let us go rejoicing

Next Sunday is Gaudete Sunday! On the third Sunday of Advent, we rejoice as we get closer to the coming of the expected Savior.

Although the first, second, and psalm readings are filled with the message of joy and rejoicing, the Gospel reading from Luke seems a bit grimmer. Yet, is it?

We find John the Baptist answering questions from the crowds about how to live a life of

baptism will be of the Holy Spirit and fire.



The passages emphasize the importance of living a just and compassionate life. Zephaniah's prophecy speaks to the need for social justice and the restoration of the oppressed; Paul encourages the Philippians to live a life characterized by peace and love; and John the Baptist calls for repentance and a commitment to share with the needy. All three passages from the readings, including the psalm, highlight the theme of joyful restoration, peace, and justice, with each passage pointing to the call for collective renewal and social responsibility through faith and action. God's commitment to uplifting the broken and disenfranchised provides a powerful foundation for a community that values restorative justice.

John's teachings from Luke's gospel are intensely focused on practical actions that reflect justice and fairness. He instructs people to share with the needy, to act fairly, and to avoid exploitation. This call to action is about putting faith into practice in concrete, ethical ways that impact others. John's message insists that genuine repentance and faith are inseparable from active social responsibility, with an emphasis on dismantling structures of greed and inequity.

These readings express the importance of experiencing God's love and joy while also seeking to embody that love through concrete actions of compassion, justice, and concern for others' well-being. The intersection highlights how spiritual fulfillment and social uprightness go hand-in-hand and are not meant to be expressed independently.



### **Advent Action: Peacebuilding**

At the lighting of the National Christmas Tree in Washington, DC, on Dec. 5, Christians for Ceasefire hosted a vigil nearby to honor the tens of thousands killed in Gaza. Joined by FAN's Peace Fellow Eli McCarthy and Executive Director Michele Dunne, the group prayed, sang, and bore witness to the suffering of the people of Gaza.

The group carried a tableau of the the baby Jesus wrapped in a keffiyeh, placed among rubble—a reminder, as Friends of Sabeel North America says, that "all the victims of this genocide are Christ in the rubble."

Pope Francis took a similar action on December 7, visiting a nativity scene in the Vatican's Paul VI Hall that showed the baby Jesus lying on a keffiyeh, a traditional Palestinian cloth. The Pope asked that all remember our brothers and sisters, including in Bethlehem, who are suffering from war now.

<u>Suggested Action:</u> Organize your own vigil or prayer gathering to call for peace in Gaza. Use <u>this prayer kit</u> for guidance.
