Reflection Date: January 5, 2025 - The Epiphany of the Lord

Overjoyed at the Star

As the Church prepares to celebrate the Epiphany of the Lord, it is worth considering what an epiphany is. This colloquial definition of epiphany from the Cambridge Dictionary transfixed me: "a moment when you suddenly feel that you understand, or suddenly become conscious of, something that is very important to you; a powerful religious experience."



The story of the powerful religious

experience of the Magi at Bethlehem is so moving. They are "overjoyed" at the appearance of the star and willingly "open their treasures" to offer precious gifts to the babe. The Magis' experience calls to mind the effect on St. Francis of his famous encounter with lepers, as told in *The Testament* (1226): "And the Lord Himself led me among them and I showed mercy to them. And when I left them, what had seemed bitter to me was turned into sweetness of soul and body. And afterwards I delayed a little and left the world."

In the case of the Magi as well as that of Francis, the epiphany is an overwhelming sense of the goodness and beauty of God, suddenly manifested not in a magnificent temple but in unpropitious circumstances: a baby born in poverty in a Judean backwater town, people suffering from a disfiguring disease and living as outcasts. But those externals do not matter at all, as the person experiencing the epiphany suddenly sees the divine light beaming forth, permeating our everyday reality.

What also strikes me is that these epiphanies bring about a natural progression; a powerful experience of God's presence and love leads to an eagerness to give generously back to God. The Magi offer their splendid and impractical gifts (what to give the newborn king who has everything?). While we do not know whether they continued to give after their discreet exit from Herod's kingdom, T.S. Eliot imagines in <u>Journey of the Magi</u> that the birth of Jesus affected them profoundly: "We returned to our places, these Kingdoms, but no longer at ease here, in the old dispensation, with an alien people clutching their gods."

We know much more about Francis, who gave up the world he knew and turned over his life to God. This giving manifested itself in a profound life of prayer as well as deep care for the lepers and other marginalized people. Psalm 72, part of the Epiphany readings, says that a wise and just ruler guided by God, "shall rescue the poor when he cries out, and the afflicted when he has

no one to help him. He shall have pity for the lowly and the poor; the lives of the poor he shall save."

When I think back on the small epiphanies I have experienced, this experience rings true. An infilling with the love of God leads naturally and inevitably to an outpouring of love for God and a desire to show love for all that God has created.

As we begin this new year, I pray that each of you will experience such an epiphany and will pour your love forth in many demonstrations of care for all God's people and His wondrous creation. Bless this nation and all who inhabit it.


Fill us with the light of Christ, that our concern for others may reflect your love.
