Reflection Date: January 19, 2025 - Second Sunday in Ordinary Time

Everyone serves good wine first

"Everyone serves good wine first, and then when people have drunk freely, an inferior one; but you have kept the good wine until now."

The gospel reading (John 2:1-11) for the <u>Second Sunday in</u> <u>Ordinary Time</u> tells the familiar story of the wedding feast at Cana. Unlike many other gospel stories focused on serious healings or exorcisms, this one begins with a social problem: the wine has run out. At Mary's urging, Jesus performs a miracle, ensuring that the celebration continues. John tells us that this act "revealed his glory" and made his disciples believe in him.

Mary plays a key role in this story. She notices a problem—seemingly trivial—and insists on action. Even as Jesus protests, "Woman, how does your concern affect me?" he trusts her judgment and acts. What follows is an extravagant gift of grace that transforms the celebration and brings joy to the community.

As members of the Franciscan Action Network, we can benefit from reflecting on the light mood of this gospel. We are surrounded by immense challenges: human suffering, environmental destruction, and deep divisions. Our work often feels heavy and focuses on urgent matters. But this lighthearted gospel also reminds us that faith calls us to celebrate life, human relationships, and communal joy.

Our Franciscan tradition teaches that prayer should inspire action. Like Mary, we are called to notice when the "wine runs out" in our communities and advocate for action. Whether through organizing, speaking out, or simply building connections, we can make a difference. As Isaiah reminds us, "For Zion's sake I will not be silent" (Is. 62:1-5), and Paul teaches that all gifts, no matter how small, work together toward God's love (1 Cor. 12:4-11).

In a time when our world feels divided and fractured, the question remains: where has the wine run out in your community? How can you help restore joy and connection? It might be as simple as sharing a coffee or a beer with someone you've grown distant from, or reaching out to a neighbor or friend despite political or ideological differences.

The invitation in this story is clear. Like Jesus at Cana, we are called to respond with generosity and act in ways that magnify God's love. By doing so, we can help bridge the divides in our world and bring grace and unity to a hurting and divided community.

Advocacy Works: Petrochemical Plant Cancelled



Mitsubishi Chemical Group has officially announced the cancellation of its proposed petrochemical plant in the river parishes (Ascension, St. James, and St. John the Baptist) of Louisiana. The plant would have emitted tons of harmful pollution and greenhouse gas. A coalition of climate justice activists organized the public to send comments to the Louisiana Department of Environmental Quality (LDEQ).

This outcome highlights the power of activism and community organizing in promoting environmental justice.
