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Reflection Date: January 26, 2025 - Third Sunday in Ordinary Time

Today-Not Yesterday and Not Tomorrow-Today

Today, in your hearing, this passage is fulfilled!

Imagine, for a moment, the explosive power of the word "today." Not yesterday or tomorrow, but *today*. Here and now... *today*!

In the shadow of an unfolding Year of Jubilee, Jesus stands to read, is handed a parchment scroll, and unrolls it to reveal the heart of Isaiah's prophecy:

The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to bring glad tidings to the poor.

He has sent me to proclaim liberty to captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free, and to proclaim a year acceptable to the Lord.



After he finishes, Jesus sits down. Looking directly at you, he declares that the good news of God's eternal love is here—*today*. It is now.

In the radiance of this moment, Jesus proclaims that God's words are truly Spirit and life. They are fulfilled in our midst through the Incarnate Word of a loving God—God's Word made flesh. He is the source, the message, and the manifestation of pure love made visible.

Today, through him, hear the good news of God's unconditional and eternal love for you. Today, in him, discover true freedom. Today, let him break the chains that bind your captivity. Today, let him lift you up.

Today, Jesus says, there is nothing to fear, nothing to regret, nothing to imprison you. Know that there is nothing anyone can say that has more power than Jesus' love for you.

"Today," hear the Word of God and let it take root in you. Hear his invitation: to be his body; to be his blood. Let Jesus speak to your inner spirit:

"You are my beloved—yes, you! To you, I have given all the gifts necessary and so much more. And realize, you are not alone. Look and see your companions—your sisters and brothers. These, too, are my gifts to you and to them. Together, we are companions on an eternal journey."

Now is the hour. Now is today. "Today." That's it.

For the Church and its leaders, to serve as beacons of the light of Christ in a world in the shadows of fear, violence, poverty, and death, we pray to the Lord...


Feb. 4 Immigration Webinar

Catholic Elements of Immigration Reform

Earlier this month, the Justice for Immigrants Campaign (JFI) of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB) released a document outlining the six Catholic elements of immigration reform. They are as follows:

- 1. Enforcement efforts should be targeted, proportional, and humane.
- 2. Humanitarian protections and due process should be ensured.
- 3. Long-time residents should have an earned pathway to citizenship.
- 4. Family unity should remain a cornerstone of the US system.
- 5. Legal pathways should be expanded, reliable, and efficient.
- 6. The root causes of forced migration should be addressed.

Hope Border Institute Urges Action on Migrant Deaths



On January 13, the Hope Border Institute (HOPE) spoke to the El Paso County Commissioners Court about the alarming number of migrant deaths in the El Paso Border Patrol Sector. The Court adopted a resolution acknowledging the crisis and recognizing the importance of humanitarian efforts like HOPE's to address these tragedies.

Progress in Gun Violence Prevention

FAN advocates for gun violence prevention as part of our peacemaking efforts. At the beginning of the Biden administration, we advocated for the appointment of an ATF Director (Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms, and Explosives). Steven M. Dettelbach was appointed in 2022, and together with his staff, the White House Office of Gun Violence Prevention, and the additional tools provided by the Bipartisan Safer Communities Act, significant progress has been made to prevent gun violence. Here are some key highlights:

- Crime Reduction and Enforcement Gains: Violent crime hit a 50-year low, including a 17.5% drop in murders and a 7.8% decline in robberies.
- Cracking Down on Organized Crime: The ATF has intensified investigations into violent criminal organizations.
- **Dismantling Firearms Trafficking Networks**: Efforts have successfully targeted the illegal distribution of firearms.
- **Combating Emerging Threats**: This includes increasing law enforcement recoveries of privately made firearms and machine gun conversion devices at crime scenes.

FAN will continue to advocate for increased investments in accountability and gun violence prevention efforts by the ATF.
