# "I have done what is mine to do. May Christ teach you what is yours."

This classic quote from St. Francis not only works well with the readings for March 16, the Second Sunday of Lent, but has also been a near-constant mantra for me in my work with FAN.

In the first reading, God directs Abram/Abraham to carry out sacrifices to continue his commitment to God and gain land for his descendants, who continue to follow God and set into action many events that fill the Bible. In the second, Paul



emphasizes the importance of listening to/embodying Christ to the Philippians so they may be in union with Him. Finally, in the gospel reading–after Peter, John, and James see Jesus transformed and conversing with Moses and Elijah–God says, "This is my chosen Son; listen to him." All of the people mentioned in these readings had many things they could have done, but in deciding to listen to God they became able to do incredible deeds.

As the Legislative Director at FAN, there are so many things that I could do, and I often feel pulled in many directions, especially with the state of the world right now. There is so much need right now, and there are a lot of things that I/FAN could do to respond. However, I am constantly asking myself, "What is mine/FAN's to do?". While not always easy, figuring out what is ours to do is the only way we can get through. I know that mine to do includes bringing the Franciscan sense of love and justice into whatever I do, whether that is meeting with our various partners and lawmakers, educating our network, connecting with them, or providing them with resources. I also know that taking care of myself is a critical part of what is mine to do, because if I do not do that, I cannot do everything else that is mine to do.

I think I can safely say that the Franciscan family is called now to show up. Show up for our immigrant brothers and sisters who are being persecuted. Show up for the communities being disproportionately affected by climate change. Show up for those who are struggling economically. These are things Franciscans have been doing for centuries and it is time to do them in a whole new way. 
