# The Same Lord of All

The <u>readings for March 9, the first Sunday of Lent</u>, remind us of God's providential call to remember and act. Our first reading from the book of Deuteronomy urges us to recall our shared history and to respond generously. The letter to the Romans reminds us that God's grace is for everyone, not just those who are deemed worthy. The text tells us that *"there is no distinction between Jew or Greek, the same Lord is Lord of all."* This is a clear message of inclusivity and oneness. The Gospel of Luke highlights the importance of resisting the temptations of power and privilege, calling us to live with integrity and purpose.



These passages speak directly to many of the challenges we face today. In a world marked by inequality, division, and systemic injustice, God's call to justice is more relevant than ever. Movements for racial equity, economic justice, and environmental stewardship can draw inspiration from these passages, which emphasize the dignity and worth of every person.

They also remind us of our shared humanity, challenging us to build inclusive communities and inspire us to resist the forces of oppression and corruption. As we reflect on the readings for this first Sunday of Lent, we are called to act with courage and compassion, trusting that our efforts, however small, contribute to the building up of God's kingdom on earth.

We are invited to reflect on our individual and collective roles in promoting justice. How can we, like the Israelites, offer our "first fruits" to support those in need? How can we embody the radical inclusivity the Apostle Paul describes in his letter to the Romans? How can we, like Jesus, resist the temptations of power and privilege in our daily lives?

Practical steps might include volunteering with organizations that serve marginalized communities, advocating for policies that promote equity, and engaging in practices of prayer and reflection to sustain our commitment to justice. By grounding our actions in the Word of God, we can draw strength and guidance for the difficult work ahead. For this Lenten journey, consider joining a Franciscan Justice Circle, if there is one in your immediate area. If there is no Justice Circle, think about starting one with help from FAN.

In a world crying out for justice, our readings for this first Sunday of Lent serve as a beacon of hope and a call to action. May we, like the Israelites, remember our story. May we, like Paul, proclaim the inclusivity of God's love. And may we, like Jesus, stand firm in the face of temptation, working tirelessly for a world that reflects the justice and mercy of our Creator God. And when the way seems dark and uncertain, you can cry out like the Psalmist, "*Be with me, Lord, when I am in trouble*," and surely God will hear.

For communities affected by violence, war, and displacement—may they experience healing, restoration, and the hope of a just and lasting peace. *We pray to the Lord…* 


For all who work tirelessly for justice, equity, and peace—may they be strengthened in their mission, knowing their labor is not in vain. *We pray to the Lord…*

# Seek Alternatives to Immigration Detention Expansion

The National Religious Campaign Against Torture is raising concerns about plans to significantly expand the U.S. immigration detention system, including new large-scale facilities and the use of Guantánamo Bay. This expansion would require substantial federal funding, which would come at the cost of essential programs like Medicaid and SNAP.

As Franciscans and people of faith, we are called to uphold human dignity and seek just, compassionate policies. We encourage you to consider <u>clicking here to contact your</u> <u>representatives</u> and ask them to oppose this expansion and support humane alternatives that respect the rights and dignity of migrants.

# **Franciscan Justice Circle Updates**

The **CT-RI Franciscan Justice Circle** members have been making calls to their Congressional Representatives in support of the clean energy and climate programs under the Inflation Reduction Act that are facing threats of being repealed. They've also joined the CT Sierra Club's advocacy at the state level on supporting creation friendly policies like an Environmental Rights Amendment. One member submitted written testimony for consideration at the state legislature and others are interested in learning how to do so in the future. The FJC is considering organizing an Offering of Letters with Bread for the World.
