Reflection Date: April 20, 2025 - The Resurrection of the Lord, the Mass of Easter Day

Hope in the Darkest Places

The gospel reading for the Easter Mass (Jn 20:1-9) tells of the actions of Mary Magdalene, John, and Peter that first Easter morning. We have all experienced something like the despair Mary, John, and Peter must have felt as they went to the tomb that morning. All three are probably at the lowest point in their lives. We have all had moments when we feel that life as we know it has ended, when we lose a parent, child, or loved one, lose the means to support ourselves and our family, or are hurt by another.

Mary, Peter, and John each take action that Easter morning despite thinking that their world as they knew it has crumbled. Each goes to the grave, and with



that, they are each transformed by and amazed at the power of God. Each of them experience the empty tomb differently, in the way that Jesus knows it is best for them to believe and hope again.

Our first reading (Acts 10:34a, 37-43) speaks of Peter's witness to the hope of the Resurrection. Peter is now quite different from the Peter who denied Jesus on Good Friday because of fear. He has all but forgotten the guilt he must have felt in denying Jesus as he proclaims for all to hear, "We are witnesses of all that he did" (Acts 10: 39). This transformation that occurs in Peter as well as Mary Magdalene and John is available to each of us, to be the witness and person God created us to be.

Our world is crying out for our Christian witness of all that Jesus did. "He commissioned us to preach to the people and testify that he is the one appointed by God" (Acts 10: 42). We witness to our belief in the Resurrection whenever we allow the hope of Christ to penetrate our despair and the death-dealing structures of our world.

Jesus' Resurrection is a powerful reminder that the ruling political and religious elites do not, and will not, have the final say. Instead, Jesus Christ reigns triumphant, and he commissions us, his followers, to go to every corner of our nation and world, especially in the seemingly darkest places and times, to spread the gospel message. As we strive to live a life rooted in faith, charity, and justice, we actively build God's kingdom here on earth.

Our belief in the Resurrection impels us—amid the problems in our nation and world that may seem overwhelming at times, our destruction of God's creation, the dehumanizing and violent rhetoric that can easily lead to war, "othering" or demonizing any person or group who is different from us, extreme economic inequalities, oppression of the poor and vulnerable—to

believe something more is possible. Peter reminds us in Acts that Jesus "went about doing good and healing all those oppressed." Because of Jesus, we embrace hope and believe that no injustice is too large to overcome.
