Reflection Date: May 25, 2025 - Sixth Sunday of Easter

Blocking Out the Noise

The reading from Acts of the Apostles for the Sixth Sunday of Easter struck me as a very relevant one. Paul, Barnabas, and some of the other disciples heard from "some who had come down from Judea" that they would not be saved if they hadn't been circumcised. Being the critical thinkers that they were, Paul and Barnabas decided to check with the experts: the apostles and elders in Jerusalem. In doing so, they learned that the people from Judea were misinformed. This clarity helped the disciples and many of the other followers of Jesus.



In today's environment, there are many people "com[ing] down from Judea" who say they know how things must be done without necessarily having authoritative information. While politics/government is a clear example, we see it in countless other areas, such as the environment, health, and education. At the end of the reading, in their letter, the apostles and elders make it clear what is real and what the disciples are to do.

While today's information landscape might seem more complicated than that of the first century A.D., it's important to cultivate your own "group of apostles"- sources and people you can turn to who have reliable information and will counsel you in a way that is consistent with your values. For example, I know that I can talk to my mom and best friend, and that they will encourage me but also tell me the truth. I also know that I can count on experts in FAN's partner faith organizations to tell me what is going on and what to expect in terms of legislation and policy.

Consuming information today can feel like drinking from a firehose. We need filters and guidance to make it through. Whether it's friends, family, or other sources of information and counsel, we all need ways to block out the noise and discern what is true.
