Give Them Something to Eat

The account of <u>Jesus feeding the five thousand</u> with five loaves and two fish is one of the best-known of Jesus' miracles. As the only miracle recounted in all four of the Gospels, it has a way of capturing our imagination. If we put ourselves into the setting as Jesus' disciples, we may learn something, as the disciples did, about the adequacy of our resources. In our passage from the Gospel of Luke, the disciples have returned from their mission. We can imagine them as both exhilarated and exhausted. Words tumble out as they tell Jesus the story of their mission and adventures. They need a rest, a



break from the multitudes. So does Jesus, because he is grieving the death and burial of John the Baptist.

In Mark's account, the disciples and Jesus set sail towards a deserted area near the town of Bethsaida. The multitude follows and Jesus, tired though he is, welcomes the crowd and begins teaching and healing. When the disciples ask Jesus to send the crowd away because there aren't adequate resources to feed everyone, Jesus challenges them: "You give them something to eat." And then Jesus blesses the five loaves and two fish and gives them back, multiplied, for "the disciples to set before the crowd. And all ate and were filled."

We can be overwhelmed with the vastness of the need. So many people detained and deported. So much gun violence. So few resources for those in need of health care, housing and food security. So much harm to our Sister, Mother Earth. Or we can place our resources in God's hands and trust that God will place them back in our hands, multiplied, more powerful than we could imagine, so that we can "give them something to eat."

For everyone.


