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Reflection Date: September 28, 2025 - Twenty-sixth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Who are the Lazaruses in our lives?

In the Gospel of Luke (16:19-31), we hear the parable of Lazarus and the rich man. I first heard the parable when I played the role of the rich man in a children's liturgy skit. I remember the feeling of disappointment because the other child, who played Lazarus, entered Heaven, and I did not. But the experience taught me a much broader lesson: the importance of how we treat one another. The Gospel poses us a question: Who are the Lazaruses in our lives? It's the outcasts, the sick and suffering, and all those whose voice is not heard.



For three years, I have resided at the Saint Francis Inn in the Kensington neighborhood of Philadelphia. For over half a century, the Inn has served hot meals and provided fellowship to the poor and marginalized. Over the past three years, this experience has opened my eyes and heart to both my ministry and the words of Jesus Christ.

In Kensington, I have witnessed several individuals with sores on their bodies, especially those who are suffering from the constant cycle of addiction. I often find this experience frustrating, and I'm prone to acting like the rich man. However, I am constantly reminded that, like Lazarus, these sisters and brothers are often treated as though they are unwanted by our society. Therefore, God calls us to do more, to live counterculturally.

For over a year, I have served as an advocacy associate with the Franciscan Action Network, particularly in the areas of homelessness and housing. This experience has challenged me to reflect on my current ministry. It also challenges me to do more to make a difference. This gospel passage challenges us to stand up for those on the margins, who are viewed as a Lazarus in today's world. As my experience in Philly and with FAN has taught me, direct service

and advocacy are interconnected. Therefore, we must advocate with and in favor of those whose voices often go unheard, so that they might not live on "scraps from the table," but rather, live fully dignified lives. In a world full of extreme division and polarization, God calls us to treat one another with compassion and generosity. Lazarus remains one of my favorite figures in the gospels because his story reminds me how to treat each person I encounter with human dignity.

Complicit Companies Campaign - Expose and Divest

Complicit Corporations Campaign - Expose and Divest: A coalition of more than 35 Christian organizations (including Franciscan Action Network, Friends of Sabeel North America, American Friends Service Committee, Christians for a Free Palestine, Mennonite Action, and Palestinian Christian Alliance for Peace) has launched an economic resistance campaign focused on tech company Palantir and Chevron. Palantir supports Israel's policies of ethnic cleansing and genocide through Artificial Intelligence and surveillance contracts with the Israeli military, as well as public statements of support; Palantir also assists ICE in mass deportations. Chevron exports Israel's natural gas, creating revenues for the state. The campaign aims to create economic and political pressure to reduce corporate support for the Israel government's policies and help shift U.S. policy to end the ethnic cleansing in Gaza and the West Bank. The campaign is seeking organizational, religious community, group, or institutional (national, regional, state, or local) endorsements. See this webpage with more details.
