Reflection Date: October 12, 2025 - Twenty-eighth Sunday in Ordinary Time

The Word of God Cannot be Chained

We could reflect on the readings for this <u>Twenty-Eighth Sunday</u> in Ordinary Time and focus on the disease of leprosy. We might consider how lepers were reviled, ostracized, and through religious rituals, declared dead within their communities. We might even ponder the clear message of God's restorative healing and the importance of expressing gratitude.

All this would acknowledge the healing of Naaman (2 Kings 5:14-17), the military commander who Elisha directed to bathe in the Jordan. It would also remind us of the ten lepers healed by Jesus, who asked, "Where are the other nine?" when only one, a Samaritan, returned to thank him (Luke 17:11-19).



Our challenge though is to understand what scripture calls us to hear and do in our present time, in our current cultural milieu. Paul's Letter to Timothy reminds us that our true focus must always be Jesus Christ, the living Word of God, who can never be chained or silenced. We profess that all people are made in the image of God. We are baptized into Christ, to be living words of God, yet do we always live up to our call?

The word of God cannot be chained or silenced. Increasingly, people are becoming disposable, losing jobs simply because they speak out about injustice. Today, when people are being maltreated and ostracized, simply for who they are or for their country of origin, what is our response?

The Brazilian writer Paulo Coelho said, "If you want to control someone, all you have to do is to make them feel afraid." In the past, fear became the driving force for how people treated those suffering with leprosy. Francis of Assisi would not allow himself to be chained in fear as he embraced the leper. To what are we being called today?

At Franciscan Action Network, we are called to break free from the chains of that fear—and help to liberate others by promoting policies that affirm the dignity of every person. Through

encounter and by working for a more just social order, we can resist marginalization and fearlessly build a culture where all are valued.

Franciscans Speak Against Political Violence

FAN Board members Sr. Kathy Dougherty and Sr. Margaret Magee, FAN institutional member Sr. Liz Fuhr, and Executive Director Michele Dunne were among more than 150 faith leaders who endorsed a recent <u>statement</u> denouncing all forms of political violence and supporting freedom of speech and religious liberty. Citing recent attacks on political figures, the statement says that "violence is never the answer" and

asks all political leaders to "call for an end to violence, violent and divisive rhetoric, and to commit to seeking shared values through civil discourse and dialogue." As the statement concludes, "As people of faith, we believe that every person is made in the image and likeness of God and has inalienable dignity and worth. It is because of this that we believe that free speech is fundamental to our democracy, and it must be protected."

Christians for Ceasefire and Just Peace

Complicit Corporations Campaign: More than 35 Christian organizations have launched an economic resistance campaign focused on tech company Palantir and Chevron. The campaign aims to create economic and political pressure to reduce corporate support for the Israel government's policies and help shift U.S. policy to end the ethnic cleansing in
