

Fear of the Answer

The acronym FOMO (Fear of Missing Out) has found its way into our modern lexicon. But long before FOMO, there was FOTA—Fear of The Answer. This meant: you know you should ask a colleague/supervisor/friend/spouse/parent whether an action you plan to take is appropriate or meets their approval. But you don't ask, because you're afraid of what the answer might be. You're afraid you'll be told that you can't—or shouldn't—do something. FOTA. So, instead, we may just skip the question while mentally invoking the motto “better to ask forgiveness than permission.”

In the first reading for the [Fourth Sunday of Advent](#) (Isaiah 7:10-14), is Ahaz *really* sincere about not wanting to tempt God? Or does he just have a case of FOTA? Well, Isaiah's response, describing the sign was certainly startling: a virgin will have a child whose name will be “GOD with us.” We don't know how Ahaz received this response, but the gospel reading from Matthew (1:18-24) tells us about the question of Joseph, the righteous man.

In Joseph's case, the law was clear on the answer to his dilemma. He didn't have to actually ask the question. The law said that a pregnant, unmarried woman was to be exposed to public disgrace and stoned. Pretty harsh. Joseph knew this answer, and it troubled him. He wanted to

respect Mary's dignity as a human being, while still maintaining his integrity, so he decided to quietly end their betrothal.

Joseph must have found peace of mind with that decision, because he is able to fall asleep. And then he has a dream—a dream that provides an incredible answer to the question Joseph was asking himself. Joseph is to *cherish* Mary as his wife, bring her into his home, *accept the child*, raise the child as if he was his father, and name him Jesus. God's answer, as conveyed by the angel, went well beyond Joseph's 'discreet divorce' solution to saving Mary's dignity.

How often are we like Ahaz, not asking a question because we don't want (or are afraid) to hear the answer. How often are we like Joseph—quietly asking the question and sincerely seeking answers in laws or rules? Do we consider honoring the dignity of other people who will be affected by our decision, or do we focus on preserving our own dignity or status by invoking strict rules? As we work to build a more just society, may we keep the angel's message in mind: to protect the dignity and integrity of our brothers and sisters, even if that means s-t-r-e-t-c-h-i-n-g our own dignity and pride.

Vigil for All Victims of Gun Violence



On December 10, FAN cosponsored the **13th Annual National Vigil for All Victims of Gun Violence** at St. Mark's Episcopal Church in Washington, D.C. The Vigil featured powerful speeches calling for action in response to the epidemic of gun violence in the United States, a solemn, moving procession where friends and loved ones spoke about those they have lost to gun violence, inspiring music, and communal prayer. FAN Advocacy Associate Claire Fisher honored her former classmate Ryan Realbuto, a 23-year-old volunteer with Cap Corps who was shot and killed in Washington D.C. last year. She later recalled: "Ryan was a beautiful illustration of the Franciscan charism, especially in his gentleness and radical joy. His life was a great example to me as I discerned my own year of service; I hold his memory close to my heart as I work to serve others the way he always did."

Protect U.S. Coastlines from Drilling

The Franciscan Action Network is urging the U.S. administration to oppose a proposal to expand offshore drilling along our U.S. coastlines. Expanding drilling into the Atlantic, Pacific, Arctic, and Eastern Gulf of America, which are still largely undefiled, would put coastal ecosystems at risk.
